

Franklin Has a New Life

Franklin grew up in a hard working family in New York City. His parents encouraged him to become successful in life through higher education. Franklin had a dream of playing basketball and getting a scholarship to attend college. As a teen, he worked with his father in the family business. His dream was stalled when he started hanging around people who were taking drugs. This led him deeper into addiction and trouble. Franklin was able to maintain work, but spent his money on drugs and partying. His family stayed by his side, but trust was broken and they were very disappointed.

The 9/11 bombing of the World Trade Centers led to unemployment and he moved to South Carolina to get a fresh start with relatives. Franklin stayed clean for awhile, but soon returned to using. He came to Florida to find work and ended up in Broward. He found work, but it wasn't long before he started using drugs again. He lost everything and became homeless. He found out about our Pompano Center and decided to get help. He graduated the program, found employment, and seemed to be on the road to success - but, he started using again and he was once again homeless. This led him back to the Pompano Center and he was referred to our Miami Center for Men for a longer term program. He graduated and is now on staff.

"I can truly say that I'm excited about my future. I'm close to the Lord and am happy that I can now serve at the Mission as a staff member. I started as a resident and now am able to give back. I'm thankful to all the donors and volunteers that helped me. I now get to speak to them over the phone and meet them in person." — Franklin



Stephanie Once Needed Help and Now Helps Others

"I come from a very strong, loving, and stable family. I had many opportunities, but at the age of 14, I got involved in a relationship that introduced me to drugs and alcohol. My first relationship became very violent and I distanced myself from my family. I didn't realize it at the time, but I was becoming mentally traumatized which would lead me into other violent relationships. Relationships that were built on fear and drugs. I became involved with a man and moved to Broward County to be with him. I look back and see that I was trapped. I liked having the drugs, but didn't like the physical and emotional abuse. My drug of choice was methamphetamine (meth). Years later I found out that my mother had cancer. One of my sisters had passed away from cancer and I had not seen my family in a long time. I wanted to visit them for Christmas, but because of my addiction, I was not able to see them. My mother soon passed away. *I was broken*.

I made the decision to leave my boyfriend and went to the Pompano Center to get help. I renewed my relationship with God and really worked the program. Now I'm employed at the Miami Center for Women and Children, have re-established my relationship with my family, and am blessed to be helping other women who have travelled the road I took. I am so grateful."
